----All Quiet in the Treasury----



Did you ever wish you had just one more up-shift in your transmission?

I had a Henry Park modified drive installed on my 2017 Gold Wing. I really like the idea of the taller gearing to give more miles for less engine RPM. But, the drive I had installed seemed to have a leak. So, I called Henry and he offered to send me a replacement.

I received the replacement on Wednesday at 12:30. I checked out the drive and it appeared to be in great condition. I installed it and had the bike ready to go by 2:00 pm. I packaged up the leaky one and started out for the



UPS store to send it back. That is when I realized that the drive he had sent me had a mechanical issue that I did not see on first inspection. I obviously didn't know what to look for before I installed it. The drive was making a terrible noise while coasting. I called Henry and told him that this one was not going to work. I let him hear the noise it was making while I had it parked on the center stand. He agreed that it was not good. **Noisy Drive While on the Center Stand and in 2nd Gear** - https://youtu.be/IaMI2K1Dfrc. He said that he would send me another one.

I took it off the bike and before installing the OEM drive, I compared the two drives. I noticed that the modified drive pinion gear to ring gear lash felt loose compared to the OEM drive. That may be where the noise is being generated. After taking out Henry's drive and reinstalling my OEM drive I had made a decision. I really do not want to go through this again. I sent Henry a text and asked him to not send me a replacement but to send me the core drive I had sent him and I would then return his modified drive. Then, I would like a refund on the modified drive. I said that I had just lost confidence. After two bad ones in a row I am happy to just use the OEM drive. Besides, I didn't tell Henry but one of my riding partners here local to me bought one of Henry's drives and it appears to be leaking as well.

He sent me a text and said that he had my core in a box in the warehouse and he would have his warehouse manager look for it and send it back to me as soon as they located it.

This drive modification is REALLY a great idea. And, in retrospect it may be possible that the drive fluid level is more sensitive in the modified drive than it is in the OEM drive due to remanufactured gearing. It is entirely possible that I slightly over filled the drive and fluid bubbled up and overflowed into the drive housing and out the bottom housing drain. If you look at a final drive you will see the housing drain. That is there in case the inner seals fail and a leak occurs. It allows the fluid to drain out the bottom of the drive rather than get sprayed onto the brake assembly. Nice design.

Anyway, I have not completely made up my mind what I will do in the future. I like the re-geared drive and am still open to making the change. Henry has yet to send me the refund so perhaps he is hoping that I will change my mind about a modified drive. The saga continues.

In Washington bikers are required to wear helmets and a lot of them also wear riding gear that is seen easily. This helps the other drivers on the road see us.


Other states, like Arizona, and New Mexico, to mention a couple, do not have this requirement and boy does this make a difference for the rest of us on the road.

-----TECHNOLOGY AND AWARENESS-----

The other day I had an appointment with my cardiologist. As she was giving me the latest status regarding my pacemaker, I was thinking about how modern technology has improved our lives. I'm not considering just pacemakers, defibrillators, etc., but the advancements made on our vehicles. We think safety chrome, lights, and colors are a plus, but they have been with us for a while. Now, consider the safety features on the newer cars, trucks, buses, etc. We now have surround warnings and automatic braking. Are we getting too close to the vehicle in front either by them braking or our speeding up? We get an alarm or automatic speed reduction. Are we getting too close to an object next to us (another car or motorcycle)? Another warning buzzer goes off and maybe the car automatically drifts away from the "intruder".

I think these safety items are great. But if we or someone else is driving one of these safety wonders, will we become complacent and depend on them so much that we forget it is our own responsibility to watch out for any dangers around us.

Friends-Fun-Safety-Knowledge. The 4 things that are the center of GWRRA. Friends and Fun are self-explanatory, but what about Safety and Knowledge? Where does this activity come in? "The Levels Program" The Levels Program has 4 Levels. Level I, "Safety by Commitment". This level represents the Commitment of the Rider and Co-rider to practice and encourage safe Motorcycle operation whenever they operate their motorcycle. Level II, "Safety by Education". This Level is also referred to as Tour Rider or Tour Co-Rider. It represents the Commitment to be safer Motorcycle riders by taking part of approved Motorcycle riding courses or seminars at regular intervals. Other requirements are necessary to achieve Level II. Level III, "Safety by Preparedness" This Level represents the commitment of the Riders to be prepared in the event of an accident to give aid and Possibly Save Lives. This is achieved by becoming knowledgeable in First Aid or CPR through training and carrying a First Aid kit on their Motorcycle at all times. As in Level II, other requirements are necessary to achieve Level III. Level IV is the Cream of the Crop. "Master Tour Rider/Co-Rider". This Level represents the Highest level of commitment to safe riding and preparedness. Demonstrated history of Safe Miles, continuing education and current certification in both First Aid and CPR. There are a few of us who are Master Tour Riders and the newest Ambassador to the Levels Program is JOHN SCRIVNER of Chapter "O" Master tour number 10713. His patch and recognition at the Chapter "X" Swearing in of the new Chapter Director in Chehalis, WA. June 28, 2020. Congratulations to JOHN SCRIVNER for a job well done and many more years of safe riding to come.
