RV Vacation

After having 2 trips cancelled due to COVID this summer and both of us losing our moms this year (neither to COVID), Ann and I decided we should try and get something positive out of 2020 and take a vacation. To keep it safe and avoid hotels and restaurants as much as possible, we decided to rent an RV. So I went out Outdoorsy.com and found a 22 foot Winnebago that was available and booked it.

Neither of us had ever used an RV before, so the training provided on pickup was very helpful — using the generator, dumping the waste water, plugging in at RV sites, etc. I was a little concerned about doing it all, especially the dumping, but it all went well. The RV was a 2006, so not everything was perfect, but there were no real issues. The sleeping spaces were not quite large enough for 2 adults, so I took the bed over the cab and Ann took the bed created with the dual purpose dining area. Our dog, Maci, came along and she used a space on the couch.

We picked it up in Dupont on a rainy Friday. After the training and paperwork, we headed back north to I-90 and then east over the pass. We finally got out of the rain in Cle Elum and made our way to Potholes State Park where we spent the first night. The RV sites were pretty much all booked, but it was still a nice setting. Maci stayed awake the whole way there, and actually never slept whenever we were traveling. We think she's not a big fan of the RV experience, but she did OK and she loved it once we got out for walks to explore previously unknown territory.

The next day, we headed farther east and stopped at Palouse Falls State Park. The road in was gravel and washboard, so we had to take it nice and slow. Fortuntely we got there early and there was very little traffic. There was also no place to turn around a 22 foot RV, so we slowly made our way down the 2 mile road. I've been to a few falls including Multnomah Falls and Niagara Falls (we took a trip there from Green Bay on a GL1200 back in 2008) and Palouse Falls is the one of the best we've seen. It's probably at least as tall as Multnomah but it is below you when you view it instead of above you, and you can clearly see the pool below it. Well worth the trip.

We then headed toward our campsite in Palouse, which we discovered is not near Palouse Falls --- it's on the eastern edge of Washington. But it was a nice drive viewing the rolling hills and fields and the RV site was clean and quiet. The next day we headed toward Wawawai County Park on the Snake River. We took a short hike there and then drove down along the river. Neither of us had seen the Snake River before and the views were impressive. Although I had reserved another night in Palouse, we decided to start moving west as it looked like the weather was clearing on the west coast.

We spent the next night in Louis and Clark Trail State Park, which is not to be confused with Louis and Clark State Park. The latter has RV sites with full hookups, the former does not. Unfortunately we were confused and since we got to the wrong park late, we had to "rough it" and utilize the generator. But that's another plus about an RV — going without hookups for a day or so is not a problem as long as you have water. We had to shut off the generator at 10pm and it got a bit chilly overnight, but we had brought along good sleeping bags so we kept warm.

The next day we continued east and stopped overnight at Paradise Point State Park just off of I-5. This park was Maci's favorite stop — some rabbits made regular visits to our site and the one next to us. Maci is a beagle and they were bred to hunt rabbits, so she goes a kind of crazy when she picks up their scent. We had to break out the bark collar to keep her from disturbing the neighbors too much. We took a few walks and a short hike to the small beach down by the East Fork Lewis River.

On Tuesday, we headed toward Ocean City State Park near Ocean Shores. Along the way we stopped at Rainbow Falls State Park and viewed the falls there. They're not huge like Palouse Falls, but still very scenic. At Ocean City, we had to go without hookups for the first night again, then the second night we moved in to a full hookup site. That was one nice thing about using an RV --- just unplug and drive to the next stop without much packing up other than to make sure nothing would fall off a counter on the way. While we were there, we drove out to the beach and toured around the area. We also took a long hike along the beach. Occasionally Maci would grab a crab leg thinking it would be something good to eat, but she quickly changed her mind, so apparently she'll eat a lot of junk she but not rotten crab legs, so she has a little more sense than we thought.

Although the forecast for the coast was for sunshine both days we were there, we never saw any --- it stayed cloudy and misty. Next time we'll visit in August. After 2 days, we headed for home so we could do some cleanup of the RV before returning it. Ann vacuumed up all the dog hair and cleaned up the inside while I worked on the bugs and dirt on the outside. That took a few hours. When we returned it, we discovered that although the Outdoorsy guidelines state that you should return the vehicle as it was when you rented it, we found out that our "landlords" had not expected that, so they were happy not to have to cleanup the bugs and dog hair and did not charge us the \$150 dog cleanup fee.

The RV experience was nice. No packing and unpacking for hotels or numerous restaurant stops. The bathroom is right there when you're traveling, and the maintenance was not a big deal. Also I now understand why there are propane filling stations all over. The big drawback is having to drive the RV even for short sight seeing trips. We might do it again, but we think we might like a trailer more so that we can park the trailer and go exploring in the tow vehicle.









The riding season is about over for the fair weather riders.

Those of you that do not have the need or urge to ride in the cold and rain of the northwest need to start thinking about winterizing your motorcycles.

There are all kinds of recommendations on how to winterize the motorcycle. Did you know that the in the Honda Owner's Manual there is a page or two devoted to this subject? It says, "If you won't be riding for an extended period, such as during the winter, thoroughly inspect your motorcycle and correct any problem before storing it. That way, needed repairs won't be forgotten and it will be easier to get your motorcycle running again. For more information about storage, refer to the *Honda Motorcycle Winter Storage Guide* available from your Honda dealer (USA only)."

Truthfully, I never knew there was a section in the Owner's Manual that addressed this subject and I certainly didn't know that there was a *Honda Motorcycle Winter Storage Guide* but there is. That Portable Document Format (PDF) document is four pages long so I will not include it here but I have put a copy of it on the Chapter WA-A website, for you to view or download. It can be found at: http://www.gwrra-waa.org/pdf/winter-storage-guide-EN.pdf.

The reason that I have no real-time experience with winterizing a motorcycle is because I have always lived in an area where riding was pretty much a twelve month a year activity, at least for me.

I do know that if you do not ride the bike that you need to stabilize the fuel and you also need to keep the battery charged using a battery maintainer, also called a float charger.

To stabilize the fuel you need to follow the directions included with the stabilizer you select, Sta~Bil by Gold Eagle is a popular brand and it works very well. I discovered in July of 2007 that not stabilizing the fuel could be costly. Several years earlier, like about 30, I discovered that not keeping your battery properly maintained could cost you the price of a battery. That was on a 1982 Yamaha Virago I owned with a full fairing and sound system. That sound system had an LED clock and it drained the battery in about two months of inactivity.

In 2005 I purchased a low mileage 1998 GL1500 to replace a 1999 GL1500 that had over 160K miles on it. I rode the 1998 for a year or two and didn't even touch the 1999. I also neglected to stabilize the fuel. The engine ran great above 2000 RPM or so but below that, it lurched and stumbled. The fuel had gummed up the idle circuits and the carburetor was in need of a rebuild. That ended up costing about \$1100.

To keep your battery up to snuff, the Deltran Battery Tender Jr. is very popular and at under \$30 it is priced to meet just about everyone's budget.

In the recent past, I have had very little need to use the fuel stabilizer

except in chain saws and generators, but I do use the Battery Tender float chargers frequently. My GMC truck doesn't see much use during the spring, summer and fall and the lawn tractor gets little use when the grass is not growing so the Battery Tender's are in use pretty much full time. I also keep the motorcycles plugged in while parked in the garage.

So if you are a frequent rider you no doubt will not need to winterize your ride and the Sta~Bil is probably not on your shopping list but a battery maintainer should be. It is a good bet that you will have some type of battery operated piece of equipment that will benefit from having the battery kept topped up.

Remember to be safe and visible to the other people on the road, who also may have other things on their mind, besides looking out for you. While on this ride the way to be visible is not only riding as to be seen, but talking to people who may come up to you at rest stops, drive in's, or even at gas stations, and talk to you about the bike, are even ask you how much fun is it riding a great looking motorcycle. This is a great way to have people look out for more of us on the road, wishing they could or would have taken up such a great way to travel, or just enjoy this great world of ours.

It is also a great thing to carry some of the tri-folds in your trunk, or saddle bags, to hand out to people, who you think may like to read them, and then hand them out to other people they may know who would like them also.

During this time when visibility was not good, I saw a few bikes on the road that took me by surprise, as they were riding in the no-zone, no bright riding apparel, and weaving in and out of traffic. This is coming from a rider who is always looking for other riders on the road. What about other drivers who don't ride? Do you think they would even see riders like I mentioned in times of limited visibility?

Allot of our activities have been canceled this year, but I hope this next year is going to be a great one. Try to think of activities that will bring us, who ride and share the road, to the attention of those who do not ride. This may be bike shows, even ask if we can set them up at car shows, mall shows or other places that are inviting to the public. Riding in groups more often, or anything that will make us more visible, or any other way to bring attention to us who do ride.


